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Speaker Bios

Dave A. Bricklin

David A. Bricklin is a partner in the Seattle law firm of Bricklin & Newman, LLP. His practice emphasizes environmental, land use, and community issues.

Mr. Bricklin received his undergraduate degree from Michigan State University. He is a graduate of The Harvard Law School where he was a co-founder and editor of the Harvard Environmental Law Review. He has practiced environmental and land use law throughout Washington State since 1979.

Mr. Bricklin was closely involved in the development of the Washington Growth Management Act. Mr. Bricklin is a past President and Director of the Washington Environmental Council, former Co-Chair of the Washington Conservation Voters, and a founding member and Director of Futurewise (formerly 1000 Friends of Washington).

Tadas Kisielius

Tadas, a partner of Gordon Derr LLP, counsels public and private clients on issues pertaining to land use, water, and environmental law. He has appeared on behalf of clients in local legislative proceedings, in state and federal court, and in administrative adjudicative proceedings, including appearances before the Pollution Control Hearings Board, the Growth Management Hearings Board, the Shoreline Hearings Board, and the Boundary Review Board. He represents public clients in drafting and adopting regulations required by the Growth Management Act (GMA) and the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA). Additionally, he represents private clients in their efforts to secure land use approvals for development projects throughout the state. Sharon Rice

Sharon Rice first heard LUPA's siren song as a law clerk to Snohomish County Superior Court Judge Thomas Wynne when she wrote a bench memo on a land use appeal. Mesmerized by the four banker's boxes of documents and the then-obscure city code provisions, she was introduced to the adventuresome field of land use law. After receiving a JD from the University of Washington, Ms. Rice worked for legal services, advocating for individuals at administrative hearings. Deciding land use was a better fit, she took a contract attorney position with a firm that provided exclusively hearing examiner services for Puget Sound jurisdictions for three years. With two, partners she founded the hearing examiner firm Toweill Rice Taylor in 2005. TRT served eleven jurisdictions over five years, amicably dissolving at the end of 2010. Ms. Rice began her solo examiner firm in January of 2011; she currently contracts with nine cities and counties throughout Washington State. Since 2007, she has served as President of the Hearing Examiners Association of Washington.
