


## 2015 ANNUAL PLANNING CONFERENCE OCTOBER 6 – 8

Cultural Intelligence in Planning

## Can planners afford to ignore the rise in cultural diversity?

For decades, Washington State has been growing. Much of this growth (about 35%) has been due to natural increase in population; however the rest has been due to migration from other parts of the country and world. While the state remains somewhat less diverse compared to the national average, over the next 25 years, it is slated to become increasingly more diverse. Currently about 25% of the state's population is under 18. In this age group 40% of the population does not identify as white. What does this increasing diversity mean for planners and planning in Washington? Where and how does cultural intelligence come into play in our work planning for municipal growth and our responsibilities in administering and managing our public dollars?

This session will present an overview of the state increasing diversity by region and age cohort. It will introduce the term "cultural intelligence" and also provide some cultural understanding of the history and background of the major ethnic and racial groups in the state. Lastly, it will open the floor for discussion on tools and methodologies for including and accommodating this diversity into public outreach efforts and planning.
